
# English II Pre-AP Summer Reading Assignment 2018-2019 School Year

# Part I: Dialectical Journal

<u>Instructions:</u> For <u>every 10 letters (ex: 1-10, 11-20, etc.)</u> of *The Color Purple*, you are to compose a <u>5-7 sentence</u> response showing <u>each</u> of the following three connections:

- Text to self (make a personal connection with the text; how does it connect to your own experiences or life)
  - **Example**: This chapter reminds me of the time my father was upset at my older sister for sneaking out of the house.
- **♦ Text to text** (make a connection with another piece of literature you've read)
  - **Example:** While reading this chapter, the author reminded me of Pony Boy from *The Outsiders* because...
- **♦ Text to world** (make a connection on a larger scale; globally)
  - **Example**: This chapter made me think about a news story I saw on CNN about...

## **Literary Analysis Essay**

# What is a literary analysis?

First, know that a literary analysis is an opinion based essay(your opinion) supported with textual evidence from the piece of literature you are analyzing. When asked to write a literary analysis, you are to focus on two things: the **HOW** and the **WHY**! How did the author put the novel together and why s/he chose to incorporate specific elements into his/her writing. There are many elements that could be analyzed: diction, figurative language, characters, tone, symbolism, etc. To learn more about literary analysis, visit the link below.
