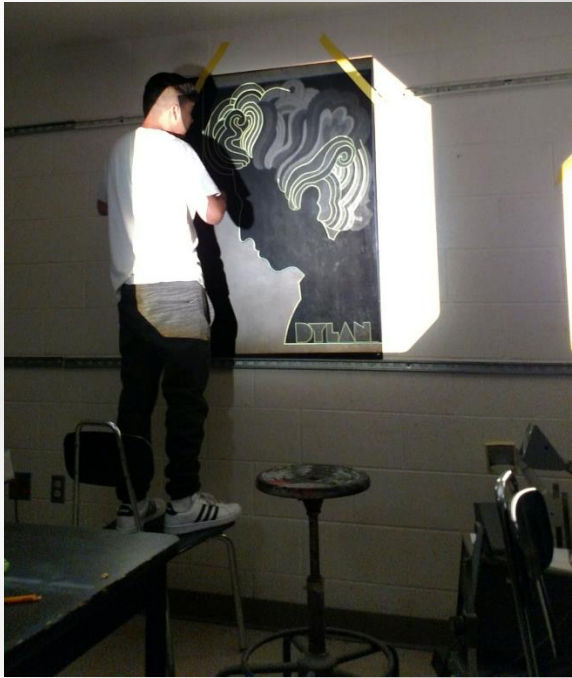

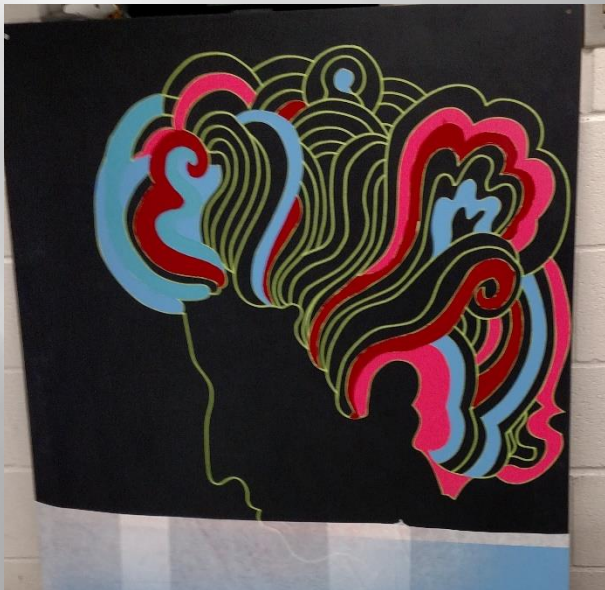

The process

In our Auto Body class, we decided that the library could use a little help in the art department. We decided to take some images that were representative of the literature that was available in our library, and recreate them. We cut the panels out of 18 gauge sheet metal and painted a background color.

Each individual color had to be taped, masked off by hand and sprayed. The green tape is 1/8" After the image and all of the colors were painted, the panels were clear coated with a matte clear to protect them.

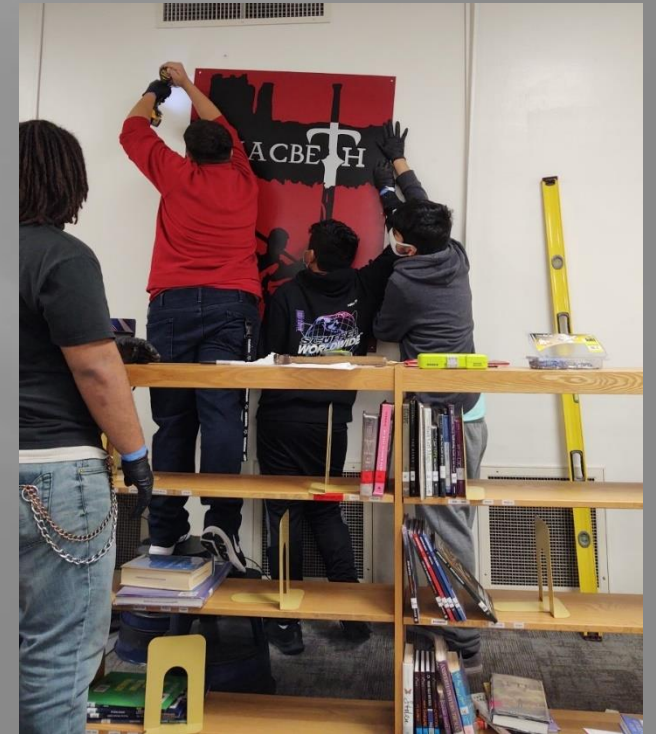

good night.*

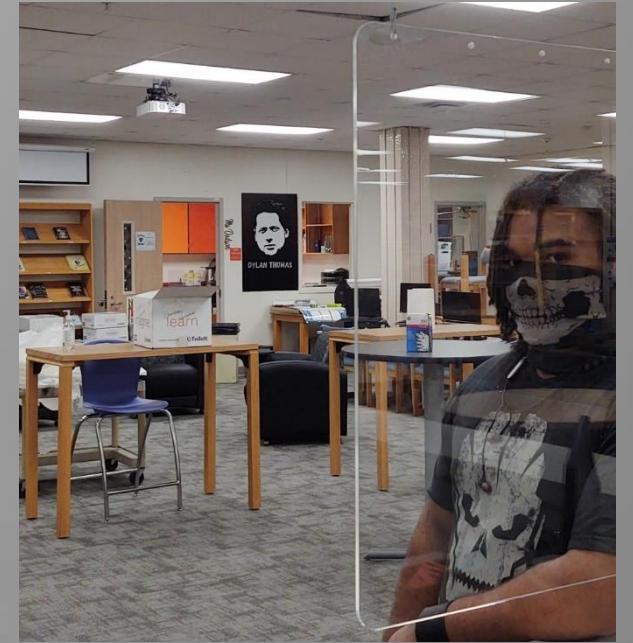

Dylan Thomas was born in 1914. At age 16 he dropped out of school to become a junior reporter for a newspaper. At age 18, he quit his job and concentrated on writing poetry fulltime. It was during his later teens that he wrote more than half of his collected works.

After living a colorful life, at age 39, he passed away.
