

Well, it looks like the Owls did it again. Garland Owls played Nocona Indians with a 13-13 point tie. Garland won the game with three penetrations to Nocona's two, in the Region 4, Class A football championship game played here. The Owls also led in first downs 13 to 11.

The largest crowd of the season, estimated at 3000 fans attended this thrilling game.

The brilliant playing of Bobby Griffin, J. B. Motley, Aurel Bittle, Preston Shugart, and the outstanding teamwork of the star eleven is said to have accounted for the wins this season. Some of their teamwork was shown when Griffin snipped a pass to Motley for 19 yards and the winning penetration of the game. Several of the boys received injuries during the season but they came bouncing back for more. The whole squad played a wonderful game. The regional game ended in almost perfect season of eleven games won and one tied. The Owls total score for the season is 267 points to their opponents 40.

Holiday Dance


The Senior Class sponsored a Christmas dance Friday night in the gymnasium.
